

Ideas for how to review this book with kids 3-6:

- What is the cause and effect of Slaters decisions?

Compare Books

Try comparing the story Slater the Skater with other Sculptlings Books, such as Peter the Skier and compare the 2 messages.

• Try comparing the characters and their lessons. How are they different? How are they the same? (Example: Both Slater and Peter like to show off for the same reasons.

Slater influences his friend to do bad things so his friend would like him more. Peter shows off to try to get his friends to like him more. They both learn that they don't need to show off to be liked.)
